We were very fortunate that the temperatures were almost perfect for allowing the snow to melt and the water to come off the mountain without high surges which occur on hot days. The highest run off this year came after the irrigation company started using water. The highest water flow at the Park bridge was about 4' deep. We still had nearly 2' – 6" of clearance from the water to the beams.

We are looking forward to a great summer of celebrations. Independence Day on July 4th, then we have Mayfield Pioneer day on July 24th. The first men to view Mayfield as a possible place to establish homes was in 1871. They started some activities in 1872 and then establish homes in 1873. 2023 marks 150 years from the first groups of settlers to establish residences in Mayfield. SO, WE WANT TO CELEBRATE!!!

July 24 we will have our usual celebrations with a Fun Run, Parade, then Activities and dinner at the Park. We will have entertainment, auction to continue to improve the town. We need many volunteers to help as we have in the past. This event could not happen without all the help from the Mayfield Lions Club members, Town Leaders, and especially you as citizens. We also appreciate all the wonderful visitors who come to enjoy the day. We need volunteers to help with all the kids booth activities, games. We are excited to have enough water in the creek to float the "ducks". We will need help setting up the canopies and booths. Please watch for the announcement.

Upcoming Mayfield Sesquicentennial Celebration September 9, 2023. Mark your calendars. We wanted to have an evening of community celebration of those who made Mayfield what it is today. We are a Community of those who live within the town boundaries, but also those who live in the south fields, up the canyon and down through Christiansburg. So come and enjoy an evening of a little bit of history, a little bit of music and a little bit of food.

We have multiple histories reflecting on the events of Mayfield through the years. We are always Interested in adding to the stories that you have. If you have stories of your ancestors, please share them to add to our history.

A couple of items I have from my ancestors:

Logging was an integral part of the 12- mile Canyon. There was a sawmill located at several locations in the canyon. There was even a sawmill located at the top of town opposite the irrigation ponds. When they closed the sawmill at Blue Lake in the corner my grandfather dismantled the bunk house and reassembled it as part of his home here in Mayfield.

Dairy was an important part of Mayfield. The local group moved cows up the mountain and would graze them below where The Old Ranger Station was across from the Six Mile turn off. They would milk the cow's morning and night there, cool the milk in the creeks and then transport the milk to town.

Some of the early residents of Mayfield moved across the mountain and settled Emery town in Emery County. To keep In touch with relatives and friends they had a community reunion on top of the mountain each summer. Emery would come the Muddy and Link Canyon roads and Mayfield would travel up Beaver Creek and they would meet at the Baseball flats for the week.

The first telephone line into Mayfield was built directly west from Mayfield over the Whitehill's from Gunnison. There was a road through the Whitehill's that started just south of the cemetery and ended up near the Sanpete County Landfill.

Those who have preceded us have left a rich legacy. Over the years many families have moved to other locations and many families have moved to Mayfield. This has added much to this community. We hope that all feel welcome and appreciated.


MADS P. SORENSEN

Mads Peter Sorensen was born in Horim, Hvirring Parish, Denmark, Feb 5th, 1836 to Soren and Annie Sorenson. He traveled to the United States in the last days of April of 1863. He located his family in Manti until the spring of 1865.


In May 1870, Mads Peter Sorensen, Simon Hansen and Carl Olsen drove their ox teams to Twelve - Mile Canyon to cut timber. They passed through Arapeen Valley and decided to move there. So for the next three years they plated crops, dug ditches and Mads P. built the first home in Mayfield located on the north side of Twelve - Mile creek. He was the first settler in Mayfield moving his family here in the spring of 1873.

Carl Magnus Olsen was Born May 27th 1833 in Malmo, Sweden to Ole Monson and Hanna Zachrisdotter. Carl was the oldest of six children. On May 1, 1861 he bored a ship and spent thirty-one days at sea. His old friend, Mads Peter Sorensen was also aboard the ship.

Carl volunteered to take his family and move to Sanpete Valley, then his moved to Richfield, next he moved to Gunnison. There he met two of his old friends Mads Peter Sorensen and Simon Hansen. These three made many trips by ox teams into the Twelve mile Canyon, bringing out logs for building cabins. On one of these trips they viewed the valley of Arapeen, named after the great Indian chief. They decided at once to make their permanent home in this beautiful valley.

Simon Hansen was born November 6th 1842, in Rolokke, Kobelev, Halsted Kolsters, Denmark, his father, Hans Simonsen, was 44 and his mother, Mette Cathrine Johansdatter or Johansen, was 39. He Married Maria Gudmundsen on July 24th 1867, in Gunnison. They were the parents of at least 1 son and 1 daughter. He lived in Kobelev, Kobelev, Halsted Klosters, Denmark in 1850 and Gridley, Butte, California in 1910. Simon died on March 15th 1934, in McGill, White Pine, Nevada. at the age of 91. He is buried in Mayfield.

The Mighty Ute Indian were under the supreme leadership of Chief Wakara (Walker) One of the lesser Chiefs was Arapeen, brother of Walker.

After Chief Walker's death, Arapeen became the big Chief of the Utes, and he at once Asked to make peace with the settlers. Arapeen was not as aggressive and warlike as Walker had been, but settlers were ever on the alert for further treachery.

Arapeen's tepee stood on the brink of the hill just back of where the Mayfield Church stands today. There, overlooking the Indian farm. He had his own little domain.

Mayor's Corner October 1, 2023

We had a wonderful time celebrating all our heritage and remembering past events. We are writing our own history as plan for the future. We are continually looking for histories and stories of those who built the things we enjoy today. We have had some requests to continue to have a relaxing social occasionally throughout the summer days. Let us know if you would like these to continue.

Mayfield has grown through the years from a very rural community to one where we now live closer together and have many more amenities. In the earliest days a trip to Manti was a full day's event. Now we can plan a trip to Manti, conduct some business and return in an hour.

In the original layout of the south side of town the blocks were 462' x 462' and were divided into 4 lots of approximately 1.25 acres each. Plenty of room between neighbors??? But they still had disagreements when cows, sheep or horses would get out. There are stories of teenage boys moving peoples milk cows around on Halloween night so that the father would get up in the morning and find the wrong cows in his corral. As ½ block lots gave way to smaller lots we became closer neighbors. Smaller lots put homes and out buildings closer together which thus requires each of us to be considerate of the effect of our activities have on our neighbors. We can no longer say that I was here first or I am entitled. Mayfield, like other towns, have established ordinances governing what is allowed and what is prohibited inside the town limits and the size of lots required for specific activities.

Thank you so much for making our 150th Birthday Party (Sesquicentennial) a success! We are fortunate to have talented locals who are willing to have fun and help us out on things like

Having large animals both inside the town limits and in the town buffer zones are allowed by ordinance if the lot sizes are sufficient to house them and not create a nuisance of odor or flies. The keeping of animals is regulated. They are not allowed to roam freely so that they do not become a nuisance. We have banned dogs from the park because we have had children step or fall on dog poop that was not picked up by the owner or from a dog running loose. Many times, the ordinances are written that affect 100% of the people when only 5% are creating the need for ordinances. If we choose to live in a community, we are obligated to accept the ordinances as established. Ordinances are established for the good of all. Times change and the need for adjustment to the ordinances is an ongoing process. An engaged electorate helps us all work to establish a special community. We thank you all for your help in making Mayfield a special place, not only for its beautiful surrounding, but it each of you as citizens. Thanks to all of you.

DRINKING WATER SOURCE PROTECTION

Mayfield Town has completed Updated Drinking Water Source Protection (DWSP) Plans to protect our drinking water from contamination. While not all of you live within our DWSP zones, some of you do. However, if all of us follow the suggestions listed below, groundwater is less likely to be contaminated:

Septic Systems

- 1. Do not use garbage disposals. Garbage disposals add massive amounts of solids to the septic tank and are a leading factor of clogged systems.
- 2. Do not dispose of disposable diapers, sanitary napkins, paper towels, colored toilet paper or tissues in the septic system. These wastes do not decompose.
- 3. Do not put fat, grease, or oil (including cooking oil) down the drain. These items can pass through the septic tank and clog the leaching field.
- 4. Pump out septic systems every three to five years.
- 5. Conserve water. The less water is used, the longer the retention period in the tank and the more solids and bacteria can decompose. Install water saving devices.
- 6. Do not use enzymes or acid for treating your septic tank.
- 7. Avoid extreme peak flows by spacing out laundry loads, bathing and dish washing.
- 8. Do not put chemicals into the septic tank for the purpose of maintaining or declogging the leach field. There are no known chemicals, yeasts, bacteria, enzymes or other substances capable of eliminating or reducing the sludge and scum so that periodic pumping is unnecessary. Many of these cleaners contain highly concentrated organic solvents that are not biodegradable and pose a serious threat to groundwater.
- 9. Do not dispose of pesticides, disinfectants, acids, medicine, paint thinners and other household hazardous wastes in the septic system. These wastes will kill the helpful bacteria in the tank and may contaminate groundwater.

Insect Sprays and Weed Killers

Special precautions should be taken when disposing of empty containers. Rinse the container three times with water and use the rinse water in the same manner the original product was intended. Then wrap the container securely in plastic and dispose of it in the trash. Unused products should be taken to a solid waste facility.

- 1. Minimize the use of chemical products and use only as directed.
- 2. Consider using less toxic alternative products.
- 3. Consider "co-planting" using companion plants that act as natural deterrents to pests.
- 4. Use plant guards, such as paper or tin barriers to deter insects.
- 5. Consider using traps of various kinds to trap pests.
- 6. Hand pick weeds as much as possible or use weed killers in limited spot applications.
- 7. Use heavy mulching around plants to deter weed growth.

Fertilizers

- 1. Minimize the use of chemical fertilizers.
- 2. Water lawns normally after fertilizing rather than waiting for a rainstorm.
- 3. Allow grass clippings to remain on the lawn.
- 4. Mow high (about 2 inches), mow often and use sharp blades.
- 5. Water deeply but not too often.
- 6. Remove thatch build-up when it gets over ½ inch.

Household Hazardous Waste

The best way to handle household hazardous materials is to completely use the product before disposing of the container. If this is not possible, then the next alternative is to return unused portions to your community household hazardous waste clean-up day. Keep products in their original package with all labels intact. If the container is leaking, place it in thick plastic bag. Pack the products in a plastic-lined cardboard box to prevent leaks and breakage.

- 1. Do not flush household hazardous waste down the toilet.
- 2. Do not pour household hazardous waste down the sink.
- 3. Do not pour household hazardous waste down a storm drain.
- 4. Do not pour household hazardous waste on the ground.
- 5. Read label precautions and follow directions for safe use.
- 6. Recycle/dispose of empty containers properly.
- 7. Share what you can't use with friends or neighbors.
- 8. Store properly.
- 9. Use recommended amounts; more is not necessarily better.
- 10. Use the child-resistant closures and keep them on tightly.

Livestock, Poultry and Horse Waste

If you have animals, please consider that animal waste contains many pollutants that can contaminate surface water and groundwater used as drinking water sources. Probably the greatest health concern associated with livestock, poultry and horse wastes is pathogens. Many pathogens found in animal waste can infect humans if ingested. Organisms like Cryptosporidium, Giardia lamblia and Salmonella can induce symptoms ranging from skin sores to chest pain. E. coli, which causes diarrhea and abdominal gas, had been the source of disease outbreaks in several states. Particularly virulent strains of E. coli can cause serious illness and even death. Cryptosporidium is of particular concern because it is highly resistant to disinfection with chlorine. This protozoan causes gastrointestinal illness that lasts 2 to 10 days in healthy individuals but can be fatal in people with weakened immune systems. Cryptosporidium was responsible for more than 50 deaths and an estimated 403,000 illnesses after contaminating a Milwaukee drinking water supply. Runoff from cow manure application sites was a suspected source of the Cryptosporidium.

- 1. Do not let runoff through animal waste accumulation areas flow off your property.
- 2. Establish a vegetative buffer zone down-slope to detain and absorb waste.
- 3. Any manure that has accumulated in piles should be periodically hauled off and spread out on pasture or crop land.

Agricultural Cropland

- Pesticides must be used in strict accordance with label instructions ("the label is the law").
- 2. The chemical in fertilizer that can most easily pollute groundwater is a form of nitrogen called nitrate. Nitrate moves readily in soil to the groundwater strata. The best way to prevent the movement of nitrate into the groundwater is to apply no more than crops can use during the time that the plants are growing.

Thank you for your efforts in protecting one of our community's most valuable resources. By working together we can ensure that Mayfield Town continues to have a safe and adequate supply of water for many years to come. YOU CAN AFFECT THE QUALITY OF THE WATER YOU DRINK


Many public drinking water systems are contaminated each year by pollutants or contaminants that backflow into the water system through unprotected cross-connections.

Identifying and eliminating or protecting cross connections is a matter of public health!


What is a Cross-Connection?

A cross-connection is a physical connection (piping configuration) between the public drinking water system and anything else, including another

water supply that can allow undesirable pollutants or contaminants to backflow into the public drinking water system.







What is Backflow?

Backflow is the reversal of flow from a residential or commercial water system back into the public drinking water system. A backflow incident could occur if the water systems pressure decreases, or the

customer's water pressure is higher than the water systems pressure. A backflow incident could carry pollutants or contaminants into our public drinking water supplies making them unsafe to use.

The Plumbing Code and the Utah Public Drinking Water Rules require that all cross connections be eliminated or protected against backflow by installing an approved backflow device or assembly that will insure that no impurities or contaminants are introduced to the public drinking water supply.

Can I protect my home or business from the dangers associated with cross-connections and backflow?

Yes! Several common cross connections are described below:


Threaded Hose Connections (Hose Bibs)

A large majority of backflow incidents are created by the common garden hose. Hoses can be connected to most anything that may contain undesirable substances such as chemical sprayers, buckets and pools, stock troughs. Plumbing Code requires that all threaded potable water outlets (hose bibs or sill cocks), except

water heater drains and clothes washer connections, be protected by a non-removable hose bib vacuum breaker or an atmospheric vacuum breaker. The installation of a hose bib vacuum breaker is an inexpensive way to protect against contamination.








Landscape Sprinkling System

The Plumbing Code requires that all landscape sprinkling systems connected to the public drinking water system be equipped with an approved backflow prevention device or assembly. Landscape irrigation systems could subject the drinking water supplies to things such as fertilizers, pesticides and animal waste.










Any sprinkling system that can utilize both public drinking water supplies and secondary water supplies must follow specific plumbing regulations to prevent raw water from entering the drinking water system!

Please contact your local drinking water supplier for specific requirements regarding landscape irrigation systems and which type of backflow prevention is appropriate for your landscape irrigation system.



Where can I get more info or have my questions about cross connections answered?


